The ship was unable to bring itself back alongside using ship's winches so the master called for tugs and linesmen. Two harbour pilots also attended and about 1 hour later the ship was again secure alongside. The pilots and tugs departed 30 minutes later. Damage to the ship's gangway and shore brow had resulted.
14/08/2012	MA201200112	12:01	UTC+9.5	No	Groote Eylandt	Stenia Colossus	IMO No	9552379	Other	During routine testing of the free fall lifeboat, with the boat in the water and being manoeuvred, the master was caught between the boat and the stern of the ship. Upon return on board he complained of pain in his pelvis and was taken ashore for assessment. He was found to have suffered only minor injuries and returned to the ship.
16/08/2012	MA201200115	16:10	UTC+8	No	Bunbury	Nord Houston	IMO No	9543251	Damage to ship or equipment	During relocation of the ship loader between cargo holds the boom of the loader came into contact with one of the ship's cranes. Damage was limited to railings on the crane head.

Note: For the purpose of subsection 49(2) of the Transport Safety Investigation Act 2003 (TSI Act) any On-Board Recordings (OBR) relating to a matter that the ATSB has decided not to investigate, as identified in this publication, are not to be treated as OBR on and after the date of publication of this weekly summary.

Section 48 of the TSI Act contains a definition of an OBR. The voice component of a Voyage Data Recorder normally meets the requirements of an OBR.

Part 6 Division 1 of the TSI Act provides for certain confidentiality protections which must be applied to OBR. When an OBR is declared not to be an OBR other protections may continue to apply such as those relating to personal information under privacy legislation.
