He was released from hospital a few hours later and returned to the ship.

While mooring crew were securing a forward breast line to the dolphin the ship's crew inadvertently began to tighten the line causing the mooring crew to take evasive action. No damage or injuries were reported.
05/02/2014	MA201400010	6:00	UTC+11	No	Berth 8 Brotherson Dock, Port Botony	Kota Laju	IMO No	9340752	Serious injury	While performing maintenance on the main engine a crew member slipped and fell approximately 4.5m to the bottom of the crankcase. He was given first aid prior to being removed ashore for transport by ambulance to hospital.

Note: For the purpose of subsection 49(2) of the Transport Safety Investigation Act 2003 (TSI Act) any On-Board Recordings (OBR) relating to a matter that the ATSB has decided not to investigate, as identified in this publication, are not to be treated as OBR on and after the date of publication of this weekly summary.

Section 48 of the TSI Act contains a definition of an OBR. The voice component of a Voyage Data Recorder normally meets the requirements of an OBR.

Part 6 Division 1 of the TSI Act provides for certain confidentiality protections which must be applied to OBR. When an OBR is declared not to be an OBR other protections may continue to apply such as those relating to personal information under privacy legislation.
